Campaign reminds drivers to Stop for the Lollipop

Drivers in Staffordshire are being reminded of the importance of stopping for the lollipop in a new road safety campaign. The campaign, being coordinated by Staffordshire County Council, is reminding drivers that failing to stop for a school crossing patrol wearing the official uniform and displaying the patrol stop sign is an offence under the Road Traffic Regulations Act 1984. It is also an offence for a driver to move off whilst the patrol is still on the road.

Stop for the lollipop signs are now being rolled out outside selected schools, including ours, to help remind drivers of their responsibilities.

David Williams, Cabinet Member for Highways and Transport at Staffordshire County Council said: "The School Crossing Patrols provide an important service in our communities and our lollipop ladies and gentlemen do a fantastic job in helping to keep children safe.

"While the vast majority of Staffordshire drivers are courteous and do stop for our patrols, sadly we do see incidents where drivers do not stop. This not only puts children's live in danger but it is a criminal offence.

"The signs have been placed around the county in the vicinity of schools and near to patrol sites and we hope that they will raise awareness of the need to stop. The signs will be moved periodically to different areas during the campaign." Staffordshire has over 220 patrols, working outside of schools and busy sections of roads. They come from all walks of life. The youngest patrol is 26 and the oldest is 83 and there is no upper age limit for the job.

The campaign also coincides with the 70th anniversary of the School Crossing patrol service which was created in 1953 with the first official patrol starting the year after. Seventy years on,

the service remains paramount to the safety of pedestrians with roads becoming increasingly busy. Further information on the service and current vacancies is available on <a href="https://example.com/en-state-united-to-united-

Sports Enrichment—Handball

On Tuesday 5th December, all children in school took part in our second sports enrichment day of the term. This half term's focus was handball.

Nursery joined in with the sports enrichment last week. We had great fun working together in teams collecting pretend jewels as fast as we could from the centre of the hall. We had to count how many jewels each team had collected.



Reception really enjoyed their session of handball. They had the tricky task of collecting 'treasure', they had to negotiate space and quicky collect the precious diamonds and rubies. The children worked really well as a team and communicated instructions to one another.





During their Sports Enrichment session, the Year 1 children imagined they had their own special island. The children travelled to their islands in their teams and collected treasure from the ocean. The team collecting the rubies were the winners with a total of 14 - well done!





Year 2 worked as a team to pass a minimum of 3 times before trying to score a goal. They enjoyed taking it in turns to play against other teams in mini tournament. The blue team won. Bobby and Stacey were selected as star players in handball.





Sports Enrichment—Handball

Year 3 enjoyed handball and were very competitive for the mini tournament. Each team had a coloured bib and they took it in turns to play against each other. The hardest rule to remember during a game was that only 3 steps were allowed when you have the ball. Year 3 worked well in teams and the points were very close in the end. Year 3 made sure they cheered each other on and shook hands at the end of the games to show good companionship and respect.









Year 4 thoroughly enjoyed their handball session last Tuesday. They played against each other in small teams and loved the fast pace and excitement of the games. As well as the competition, they needed to apply their throwing and catching skills and also think about strategy to outwit their opponents! All in all, they had a great session.





Year 5 thoroughly enjoyed the sport enrichment this week of handball. After learning the rules and some skills practice, they split into teams and enjoyed a mini tournament. Some of the Y5 and 6 children were so keen, that they independently arranged and organised games during sports club for the younger children!



Year 6 thoroughly enjoyed competing in a handball tournament during their Sport Enrichment session. Everybody took part and each child was given the opportunity to play in several different positions so they could find out which one they were suited to most. The handball coach was extremely impressed by all of the children and thinks we have enough talent to start our team!

What was Twinklepike Way?

Twinklepike Way was the name given to a cul-de-sac of houses in York, where for the past 20 years, the residents lit up their homes with brightly coloured festive decorations – the street's real name is Twinpike Way!

People came from around the UK to visit the street where they had a collection box to raise money for charity. The event has supported St Leonard's Hospice, the Yorkshire Air Ambulance, and several other charities over the past 20 years.

What will happen to the decorations?

The residents have said all the decorations belonging to the houses will be donated to charity.

After the group announced their decision online, hundreds of people commented to thank the residents for all their hard work over the years.

Most of us are pensioners now, and it's also due to other problems including electricity charges and the closure of the Haxby bank and the cost of replacing decorations. It was time to call it a day. Thanks to all those who have made it a success for more than 20 years.




Year 5
