Article 14 Every child has the right to think and believe what they want and also to practise their religion, as long as they are not stopping other people from enjoying their rights. Governments must respect the rights of parents to give their children guidance about this right.



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St. Leonard's Primary School Promoting British Values in School

The Department for Education has introduced a statutory duty for schools to promote British Values more actively from September 2014, and to ensure they are taught in schools. They have reinforced the need "to create and enforce a clear and rigorous expectation on all schools to promote the fundamental British values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of those with different faiths and beliefs."

St. Leonard's Primary School is committed to serving its community. It recognises the multi-cultural, multi-faith and ever-changing nature of the United Kingdom. It also understands the vital role it has in ensuring that groups or individuals within the school are not subjected to intimidation or radicalisation by those wishing to unduly, or illegally, influence them.

It follows equal opportunities guidance which is intended to help to ensure that this school promotes the individuality of all children, irrespective of ethnicity, religion, attainment, age, disability, gender or background. St. Leonard's Primary School is dedicated to preparing students for their adult life beyond the formal, examined curriculum and ensuring that it promotes and reinforces British values to all its students.

The school uses strategies within the national curriculum and beyond to secure such outcomes for students. The examples that follow show some of the many ways St. Leonard's Primary School seeks to instil British Values.

Democracy

Pupils have the opportunity to have their voices heard through our School Council/Pupil Voice/Pupil Questionnaires.

The rule of law

We have a strong values-based ethos which reinforces and rewards good conduct. Children are helped to understand their responsibilities towards others, to respect others and their property and to relate these responsibilities to school rules, codes of conduct and the world outside school. Visits to school from the police and fire service help re-inforce this message.

Individual liberty

Within school, pupils are actively encouraged to make choices, knowing that they are in a safe and supportive environment. As a school we educate and provide boundaries for young pupils to make choices safely, through provision of a safe environment and empowering education. Pupils are encouraged to know, understand and exercise their rights and personal freedoms and advise how to exercise these safely, for example through our E-Safety and PHSE lessons. Whether it be through choice of challenge, of how they record, of participation in our numerous extra-curricular clubs and opportunities, pupils are given the freedom to make choices.

Mutual respect

All individuals and their views and beliefs are respected, valued, cherished and protected. Pupils understand their right to receive an education and know the consequences of their behaviour choices on others. Pupils treat each other, staff, visitors and members of the wider community with respect and politeness.

Tolerance of those of different faiths and beliefs

This is achieved through enhancing pupils understanding of their place in a culturally diverse society and by giving them opportunities to experience such diversity. Assemblies and discussions involving prejudices and prejudice-based bullying have been followed and supported by learning in RE and PHSE. Members of different faiths or religions are encouraged to share their knowledge to enhance learning within classes and the school.
